Construction of the Mountaineer Xpress

Pipeline in 2021 and 2022 brought hundreds of workers to the county which increased economic activity in the area. Additionally, there have been several extraordinary economic announcements for the county, of which some projects have already broken ground. Economic development activity totaling approximately \$537 million has either been recently completed, is currently under construction, or is planned to commence in the near future. The largest of these announcements is the Berkshire Hathaway Energy Renewables industrial site in Ravenswood (total valuation of \$500 million), which includes a solar power plant project, a titanium melt facility, and a titanium product manufacturing plant. The projects in the preceding tables are expected to create an extraordinary number of new jobs in the area. In addition, infrastructure projects totaling about \$304 million are either under construction, have recently been completed or are planned within the county.

- Frontier received \$5,710,010 in Major Broadband Project Strategies funds for expansion of broadband connectivity to 1,967 targeted addresses in the greater Ripley area, including locations in the communities of Kenna, Given, Gandeeville, Gay, Evans, and Kentuck. The project will approximately 249 miles of fiber.
- Frontier also received \$7,672,782 in MBPS funds for the expansion of broadband connectivity to 4,165 targeted addresses in the greater Ravenswood area of Jackson County. This project will serve locations in the communities of Ravenswood, Cottageville, Sandyville, Evans, Ripley, Millwood, Mount Alto, Peewee, Somerville Fork, Le Roy, Amigo, Elizabeth, and Lindale. The project will include the installation of approximately 381 miles of fiber infrastructure to provide broadband service in the project area. Over 6,000 addresses will be served with these funds.







Workforce Training at WVUP's Jackson County Center:






